MRA is 20! A History

In 1994 the Midtown Shopping District was looking very sad and rundown. Bergmann's Department Store, a Midtown institution since 1956, had closed. Bergmann's was not exactly a haute-couture destination, but was a great place to buy cotton underpants, kids' toys, and sewing supplies. And free wrapping came with every gift purchase! The Bergmann's location is now No Excuses Personal Fitness. I was also a regular at Midtown Market, now CVS. The market was small, but it had an excellent full-service meat counter. This small supermarket also dated from the 50s.

In 1995 we lost Midtown Pharmacy when its owner, Carl Gould, decided to retire and could not find a buyer to take it over. This building is now occupied by Palo Alto Café.

Like many of the neighbors of the Midtown Shopping District in 1994, I felt bereft. Merchants I'd supported for years were gone, and the empty shells left behind made the whole district look "blighted".

Our neighbor and founder of the Midtown Residents Association, Debbie Mytels, decided to take action. She organized a meeting at what is now Mike's Café, but was then a delicatessen. About 50 people squeezed into the space; everyone was concerned that his or her neighborhood-shopping district was an eyesore. The consensus was to organize and try to put pressure on city officials to see if useful replacements could be found for what we'd lost. We also decided at that meeting to organize a neighborhood association. Our second meeting was at St. Marks. And then we had a third. I had attended all the meetings and agreed to become the treasurer of our newly created Midtown Residents Association. At that point we were down to about 20 stalwarts. We all threw some cash on the floor of the meeting room. I gathered it up and opened a checking account. And so began MRA.

Since those early days the Midtown Residents Association has certainly grown. We have thousands of households listed on our database. Our regular enews keeps our community informed of events and meetings of interest to both children and adults. We just held our 20th anniversary celebration at our Ice Cream Social on September 14 and, as always, the event was well attended.

Why You Should Vote

Did you vote in the last election in June? Of course you did, but 70% of your neighbors did not. Some did not even bother to register to vote.

Why not?

Some say it doesn't matter, their vote isn't important.

Others say, what difference does it make. They are all crooks in Washington or Sacramento or wherever.

Other say, they are too busy. They don't have time to vote.

But to all those who choose not to vote or forget to vote, they are letting others decide who will govern them or which measures will be supported.

Does one vote matter? Absolutely. Historically there have been a number of close races. For example, in the primary in Virginia this year, fewer than 10% of the voters came out to defeat Eric Cantor, House Majority leader. In California, the race for controller in the primary was very close; Yee beat Perez by 481 votes statewide. Locally the measure for the Midpeninsula Regional Open Space District won by only a small margin, needing 66.67% to pass and passing with 67.9% voting yes.

Do vote this November. Encourage your friends and family to do so and to register to vote, if they have not. In Palo Alto there are five seats to be voted upon for Palo Alto City Council and two seats on the school board. The Council and School Board vote on policies and make decisions that affect all of us now and in the future.



Fiber to the Premises (FTTP) - Has Its Time Finally Arrived?

For more and more Americans, access to high-speed Internet has become an essential part of our lives. Fiber to the Premises (FTTP) provides ultrafast internet speeds, 20 – 100 times faster than what is available today. However, the U.S. is falling behind the world on this front.

What's at stake is whether the new ideas of the 21st century will come from the U.S. or not. In Beijing, Stockholm, and Seoul, these very high capacity networks are taken for granted the way we think of sewer or electrical service. We risk no longer being the country where new ideas flourish.

A city-wide FTTP system is a natural monopoly; you only need one, just like you only need one electrical connection to your house. How FTTP is provided and by whom are critical decisions.

Palo Alto has an existing fiber network (currently 41 miles long) and has \$18M reserved in a fiber fund that can be used to expand service. For 17 years, we've struggled to develop a business plan to bring it to residents—initially because no one had done it before and then the recession made it more challenging. Now's the time to finally get this done. Several cities in the U.S. have paved the way by successfully deploying systems. The city is currently evaluating two paths — Google Fiber and a City owned-service managed by a private company.

The primary question is not technical but anti-competitive practices. AT&T and Comcast are entrenched in the city and will work hard to retain their market share. For Palo Alto to launch a service, we will need to have the political will to endure these short-term anti-competitive forces to create the long-term advantages of vastly better service at rates that include reasonable profit margins. Done right, broadband infrastructure can pay for itself, enable productivity through technology, and deliver revenue to the city.
