1) MIDTOWN TIDBITS

The National **Weather Service has forecast** that our area should expect rain this weekend with about ³/₄" for Saturday (about twice that in the foothills) and about 1 ¹/₂" on Sunday (about 2 ¹/₂" in foothills). We can expect some higher than average tide levels that could increase the likelihood of a flash flood event. However, the National Weather Service has not issued any warnings. There will be additional on-call City staff available to assist with any storm-related problems. The sandbag stations at Rinconada and Mitchell Parks and the Airport are currently stocked with filled sandbags and will be restocked for this weekend. Once this inventory has been depleted, empty bags and loose sand will be supplied at the sandbag stations and residents should come prepared with a shovel to fill the bags. OES has also placed "MilkJug Shovels" in the Sandbag Boxes in case folks don't come with shovels. I suspect sandbags will be used up quickly. Remember to stay aware of local conditions and to access updated information on creek levels, weather forecasts and more at <u>www.cityofpaloalto.org/storms</u>. PS Be a good neighbor and make sure there are no leaves or debris in street gutters.

Midtown Shopping Center: One of the key efforts for 2017 of the Midtown Residents Steering Committee will be any development in the Midtown Center. Word on the street: Plans for Peninsula Hardware will be the expansion of Mike's. Unfortunately the Midtown Garden has been removed for more parking; no current plans for development. Across the street, a Wells Fargo branch will open. The new owners are working on beautifying the building with paint, new parking and signage. The city required more parking and landscaping, so hopefully the work will be completed soon.

Current Water Blend Change: Beginning December 29, the SFPUC will temporarily change the source of our typical water supply from the Hetch Hetchy Reservoir. SFPUC will deliver water from local surface reservoirs along the Peninsula. This is necessary to accommodate inspections and repairs of the Mountain Tunnel pipeline that delivers water from the Hetch Hetchy Reservoir. The Hetch Hetchy shutdown is anticipated to continue through the beginning of March 2017. During this period, SFPUC will provide its wholesale customers (cities including Palo Alto, counties and water districts on the Peninsula) with treated water from the Sunol Valley and Harry Tracy Water Treatment Plants. In preparation for the Hetch Hetchy shutdown, SFPUC began taking water from the Sunol Valley Treatment Plant on December 23. Starting on December 29, these facilities will each provide about 80 million gallons per day (mgd) as supply to the SFPUC Regional Water System.
