Eprep Tip:

If you've been watching NBC's "This Is Us", Jack, one of the main characters, dies in a house fire. Learn from Jack's mistakes:

- 1. Check your smoke detectors at least once a month. And smoke detector batteries should be replaced twice a year unless your detector has 10-year non-removable batteries. Also, like other electronics, smoke alarms can fail over time, and could be less likely to detect smoke or issue a lifesaving warning. So if you can't remember the last time you replaced your smoke detector, now is a good time to do so
- 2. House fires often start in the kitchen. From 2006 to 2015, about 50% of fires in residential buildings were caused by cooking Take these steps to keep your family safe: a. Stand by your pan: If you leave the kitchen, turn the burner off. b. Watch what you are cooking: Fires start when the heat is too high. If you see any smoke or the grease starts to boil, turn the burner off. c. Turn pot handles toward the back of the stove: Then no one can bump them or pull them over. d. Keep a pan lid or baking sheet nearby: Use it to cover the pan if it catches on fire. This will put out the fire.
- 3. Don't go back into a burning house for anything. Residential fire victims have often returned to the burning structure to rescue a pet or another loved one, and died from smoke inhalation.
