1) MIDTOWN TIDBITS

May EPREP Tip: Water main breaks can happen after an earthquake but they can also happen at any time and without notice. Which may leave you wondering what to do if this happened in your neighborhood. First, it's important that you are signed up for emergency alerts for Palo Alto (in Santa Clara County, <u>AlertSCC</u>). You don't want to find out that you're not supposed to be drinking water after finishing off a big glass.

- Don't start using the water again until you have heard the all-clear from a community official. That's because water can be contaminated with harmful bacteria and other substances that can make you sick.
- Boil your water if told to. To correctly boil your water, bring your tap water to a rolling boil for one minute and then <u>set it aside to cool down</u>.
- Watch out <u>for flooding</u>. A recent water main break in Atlanta caused major flooding, reaching cars and buildings. Remember to stay away from flooded areas. If you are driving and encounter a flood, turn around. It is extremely important that you never drive through flood water.
- Create a water stockpile. Every U.S. home should have a minimum three-day supply of water stored, with <u>one gallon of water per person per day</u>. This water will come in handy when you need to flush the toilet, wash the dishes, brush your teeth, wash your hands and feed your pets. (*Source: American Public Health Association*)
